As an organization we are making excellent progress with the person-centred training project that you read about in last year's newsletter and you'll get an update from Julie Mallette, a leader of Helen Sanderson Associates, who is providing the training. It has also been a year of significant loss and sadness which is the cost of caring and having long-standing relationships with people.

As we look toward the future, our first priority is to the people who are currently receiving services and supports from our organization. We took time to check in with individuals and their families to understand their desires and needs at this time. Some individuals who have lived in their apartment, townhouse or home comfortably for many years now require an accessible living environment. Three people chose to move within TCE and are settling into their new homes. In the new year, three individuals from the community waiting list will be joining our organization. We are also supporting one gentleman to move out of an acute care hospital and into a long-term care home where he will receive enhanced support from our outreach team.

In these pages you will read about the evolution of our employee training initiative, revitalization of the Family Support Network and individuals excited to tell you about what they did this past summer. Sometimes the things people take for granted, such as a train ride, going to a ball game or staying in a hotel don't seem like a big deal however if you have never had the resources, the necessary supports to participate or a dedicated person to go with you, then it is a big deal. An enormous thank you to all the individuals who support people to participate and to our Special Fund donors who make these trips and many other life enhancing activities and events possible.

We are also exploring potential housing partnerships which we hope to be able to elaborate on next year as we apply lessons learned from our training and recommendations from provincial reports on housing. If you have been following the news, you know that we have a new government and it remains unclear what impact this will have on our sector. Some important reports have been or are due to be released soon to the government. We hope that they will be

Over the years you have heard from and about a wonderful matriarch of a family who is important to TCE. Two years ago Kathleen Dean wrote a letter for the newsletter describing their history and connection to TCE. Sadly, Mrs. Dean passed away early in the new year. DJ and I first met Mrs. Dean (I could never call her Kathleen) and Mr. Dean in 1986 when we started at TCE and their son Robert was a child coming to the Children's Home on Stewart St. in Sandy Hill for parent relief. A number of years later, Rob moved into TCE permanently and has been here ever since. Mrs. Dean was a fixture both at TCE and the Rosenthal Centre where Rob attended a day program run by the Ottawa Carleton Association for Persons with Developmental Disabilities.

Mrs. Dean served for five years on TCE's Board of Directors and was one of the founding members of the Family Support Network (FSN). You could always count on her to be at every bake sale, bingo, walk-a-thon and spring cleaning day. She was not only a mother to Rob but she cared for everyone who lived at TCE. Mrs. Dean knew many of Rob's friends and housemates including their families with bonds that went back many years.

I will miss Mrs. Dean's visits and remember her most for her kindness, impeccable outfits and sparkling blue eyes. I know her family, sons Robert, Bruce and Stuart and their families miss her very much.

Sadly, the Dean family suffered a tremendous loss this summer with the passing of Robert's sister-in-law, Tara Sheridan. Tara was a dedicated and much loved teacher at Elgin St. P.S. but most importantly she was the mother of Mackenzie and wife of Stuart. We extend our deepest sympathies to them and all of their extended family. considered seriously, especially any ideas about tackling the wait list with new and different approaches. TCE is committed to evolving our services to be less reliant solely on government funding. We are thrilled with the response we have received to the Special Fund fundraising efforts and can't thank donors enough. This has allowed individuals to have the experiences and purchases that our shrinking budget can no longer afford.

Our challenge now is to develop strategies that will enable our unrestricted donations to grow and be used to address extra operating pressures that accumulate throughout the year. We always hope that the Ontario Ministry of Community and social Services (MCSS) will provide added year-end financial assistance but there is never a guarantee. Every year we face rising costs to provide enhanced support in hospital or convalescence at home for medical emergencies/ hospitalizations or mental health issues, rising food costs, increases in cost of living and other areas without the corresponding funding increase to match.

We do not want to alienate our current donors with multiple requests for funds. There are other strategies in common use, including legacy giving, employed by other organizations. We know this is a delicate conversation which is why we would really like to hear any of your ideas or suggestions for fundraising, donor development or seeking out other sources of funding. You know who you are, our wonderful readership base who always send us a Christmas donation. You have been so generous over the years. I would really love to hear from you. All ideas are welcome. TCE's Progress Toward a Person-Centred System

In October 2016, the Ottawa Developmental Services Network hosted a Helen Sanderson Associates (HAS) Canada series of sessions called Breaking the Mold and brought in speakers with expertise. Linda Graupner talked about *Theory of Change, Michael Smull talked about Moving Toward a Person-Centred System (Lessons Learned)* and Al Condeluci talked about *Pathways to Community*. From this, the Network decided to submit a proposal for a 2-year grant *Organizational Change – Embedding Person-Centred Practices* project for 12 organizations in the region.

The **Organizational Change** project started in the spring of 2017. To date, the project has provided blended learning opportunities to 12 organizations, including TCE (approximately 250 Directors/Managers/Supervisors). Learning content has included Person-Centred Recruitment, Person-Centred Thinking, Person-Centred Reviews and Progress for Providers (a Person-Centred Practices self-assessment).


TCE has to date, Co-Facilitated Person centred reviews with various members of this project from numerous agencies.

In September 2018, participants from each organization came together to review efforts to date. It was incredible to hear how the implementation of Person-Centred Thinking and Practices has started to make a positive difference in people's lives. We heard stories of people having more choice and control in their lives. It was a great opportunity to hear how each organization is rolling out training and implementing strategies to embed Person-Centred Change in their organizations.

Each organization also has access to an individual day with HSA Canada who is delivering the training and support for this project. In September, the TCE management team spent a half day with HSA Canada looking at current efforts and possible next steps and will be receiving future training in designated areas to assist in the journey.

This project continues until March 2019 and will wrap-up with a final in-person session focusing on strategizing next steps to ensure that project efforts will continue beyond the project mandate.

HSA Canada and TCE look forward to further developing our partnership and continuing the journey toward a Person-Centred Organization.




Gareth's Awesome Adventure

John William Bohart

John lived at TCE's Riverbend House for the last 8 ½ years of his life. He was very content and happy, enjoying his own room and the love and attention of his caregivers and housemates.

John spent a happy childhood with his family in Pembroke where he attended Schillhart School for children with developmental disabilities. Schillhart School was named for Nora Schilling and John's mother Cora Bohart, who were founding members of the organization now known as Community Living Upper Ottawa Valley.

After the death of his mother, from the age of 12 years, John lived at Rideau Regional Centre in Smiths Falls until it closed in 2009 and he moved to TCE's Riverbend home in Ottawa.

John had the unique talent of remembering people's birth dates and carried a calendar with him at all times. He loved receiving cards for any occasion and proudly showed them to everyone.

John rarely spoke in his later years and usually did so in a very soft voice. However, he could be roused to a loud outburst if frustrated or wanted to express a feeling in no uncertain terms!

John always loved music and strummed his guitar along with Harold Frizell, one of his caregivers at Rideau Regional Centre or played along with Arlene Quinn during the music program at Riverbend. As a little boy, he sang along to his record player, belting out Christmas carols at any time of the year, as well as nursery rhymes and Burl Ives or Johnny Cash tunes.

John became a Senior Citizen in 2017, having reached the age of 65 years. This is exceptional for a person with Down syndrome and we feel it is because he had such good care, as well as good genes.

Following his fight with cancer in 2015, he was cancer free for almost 3 years, but he couldn't fight the infection and pneumonia that took him so quickly in February. He passed away in a room filled with love. TCE caregivers surrounded his bed and were so supportive of me. Thank you for all the love and care you have given to John. You at TCE are exceptional people and must never underestimate the importance of the work that you do. You made a difference in John's life, a difference for his family and for the community, by looking after our most vulnerable mem bers, giving them a life where they are understood and accepted while living in their own community. Many, many thanks from the bottom of our hearts!

On October 28th, 2018 we planted an Autumn Blaze Maple tree on the front lawn at Rivebend House in memory of John. There is a stone with a plaque at the foot of the tree. We hope the tree will grow and provide shade and beautiful red leaves in the fall. We think John would have enjoyed that.

John had a good life. We didn't want him to go, but realize his spirit is free now and he is at peace. He is one happy fella!


