

**Evolution is Exciting!**

The ways in which people with developmental disabilities in Ontario receive services and supports is always evolving as organizations such as TCE strive to support each individual to have their best possible life. Large institutions across Ontario have closed because it was recognized over time that a life in the community was possible and preferred for everyone. Evolution is never stagnant and transformation continues. What was done in the past isn't necessarily wrong; as we move forward and learn, we are exposed to new ideas and experiences which informs us about what is possible. This holds as true today as it did in the past and there are exciting new learnings about ways to support people with developmental disabilities that are truly socially inclusive.

This fall, a group of 17 employees attended several days of training entitled 'Breaking the Mold'. This is a first step in our journey to a more person-centred thinking, individualized approach to supporting people in their communities. Our 'transition team' has met since the training and plan on organizing learning opportunities for all employees which will provide tools and resources to guide our transformation over the next several years. There are a number of initiatives that are happening across the Province led by the Ministry of Community and Social Services (MCSS) which continue to support the transformation of Developmental Services.

Last year, MCSS Minister, the Honourable Dr. Jaczek announced the closure of Sheltered Workshops and the transition of individuals to community-based competitive work or volunteer/recreational activities. There are various initiatives including the 'Employment and Modernization Fund' intended to assist organizations make the transition from sheltered employment to competitive employment and also to assist staff with skills training.

The Minister's Developmental Services Housing Task Force, of which I am a member, has been working for over two years and has funded 18 innovative demonstration housing projects which are intended to address the long waiting list of people who need residential supports & services. In addition, a Pilot Project in various regions across the Province for 'Independent Facilitation & Planning' has been funded for individuals and families without supports to plan for the future.

Other projects are ongoing in an attempt to modernize the system and create more flexibility.

These are exciting times to be supporting people with developmental disabilities in Ontario as we continue in our Mission to ensure that people are part of their communities and enjoy full citizenship. Our commitment to the individuals we support, their families and our employees has never been stronger.


## Thanks Special Fund
